BOARD CORNER

At the AGM two newcomers were elected as Directors, Doug McBride, who joined the P/M committee and Ernie Rauwerda, who became the new treasurer. A well deserved thank you to Harry Fledderus who joined the ranks of retirees after serving as Director and treasurer for more than 2 decades. On January 1, 2023 not knowing what this year had in store for us and generalizing, in looking back on all that has transpired, it is needless to say, this has not been an easy year. Being faced with resignations, which undoubtedly come with its ramifications especially as it effects upper management, resulted in may additional Board meetings. It is inevitable this has affected our staff going through a time of uncertainty. Staff, we thank you for your continued commitment and love for the residents which has been so evident. Mid year Kevin Rauwerda resigned as controller. Thankfully, Carlene Boettcher, having been the controller for 14 years filled that void temporarily. A replacement was recruited; Michelyn Sciannella took on the position as the new Controller. During the course of the year, although it did not come totally as a surprise, Mara's 15 years tenure was coming to a close, a responsibility she took on faithfully and has served to the best of her ability. Resigning from 3 important positions, it was very clear we were faced with the question of how to fill these positions. Realizing the vulnerability of placing these responsibilities on one individual, the Board decided to split these positions for practical reasons and proceeded on that basis. Being fully aware filling these positions was not as simple as it sounded, especially the DOC position soon became apparent. Notices of the various positions were placed on websites and to be frank, we were surprised at how quickly the responses to the applications came in. The DOC replacement was filled quickly, but ended rather abruptly in her resignation. At the time of writing we are still pursuing filling that position. The position of CEO was filled by Ken Callaghan, well experienced as CEO and Laura Stuivenberg, also well experienced, joined the team as the new manager of Southview. We are pleased these positions are filled and they were introduced at a well attended meet and greet event on Oct. 16th. To remedy being short staffed, it is the intent to make use of an agency to alleviate that shortage when needed. It is imperative to fill the DOC position as soon as possible and it is our hope and prayer this may come to fruition so that a sense of tranquility can be experienced. Indeed a new chapter in the history of Parkview Meadows has commenced and we prayerfully in confidence move ahead.

The 8 As of Dementia

Apathy

Attention Deficit

Apathy is not depressionbut you can have both!

Some of these symptoms are also common in people who have depression, such as losing interest in things and lacking energy. This is why it can be hard to know whether a person has depression or apathy, even for a doctor. The main difference is that a person with depression will feel sad, tearful, hopeless or have low self-esteem (see the section 'Depression and dementia'). A person with apathy will not have these symptoms of low mood. Instead they will feel that they have no energy or 'spark'.

Ways to help

- -Try to find tasks and activities the person will enjoy and find meaningful. They may find it helpful to have a daily routine.
- -Break tasks down into simple steps. They may find it easier to do several small steps rather than one big step.
- -Gently prompt or help the person to start an activity, such as dressing. Give lots of encouragement to keep them engaged but try not to fuss over them. Be positive and focus on what they have achieved.
- -Don't blame the person for being 'lazy', unhelpful or uncaring. The person is not choosing to have apathy.
- -If you feel frustrated, try to remain as calm as you can to avoid the person reacting negatively.

Apathy
Lack of interest, enthusiasm or concern

Many people sometimes have less energy or 'drive', or lose their 'spark'. However apathy is different. If a person has apathy they will have little or no motivation to do things that they would usually find meaningful and worthwhile.

Apathy is much more common in people with dementia than in older people who don't have dementia. About 2–5% of older people without dementia have apathy, but about 50–70% of people with dementia have apathy. People who have any type of dementia can have apathy. However, it is particularly common in people with <u>frontotemporal dementia</u> (FTD).

Causes of apathy in person with dementia

People with dementia often develop apathy due to damage to the frontal lobes of their brain. This part of the brain controls our motivation, planning and sequencing of tasks.

If a person with apathy is withdrawn, stops doing things and loses their confidence and abilities, their apathy can get worse. People who are close to them may be able to help prevent this.

Symptoms of apathy in person with dementia


A person with dementia who has apathy will be less motivated to do things. They may also:

- -have no energy or motivation to do routine or daily tasks, such as brushing their teeth or having a shower
- -rely on other people to suggest and organize activities -not be interested in joining conversations or talking to new people
- -not be worried about their own problems
- -have unemotional responses to news or personal events
- they may seem to be uninterested or detached.



MAINTENANCE CORNER

As the ever-consistent march of the seasons continues onward, we once again approach fall and winter (I know, I said it). This summer and fall have been an eventful time here at Parkview Meadows. Just like the leaves changing color on the trees, we too have seen some change in the building, and just as the ever-consistent march of the seasons continues onward, so do we.

The Gardenview building has seen most of its flooring replaced from the old carpet or linoleum to a vinyl plank. This new flooring helps with the building's infection control procedures and allows us to keep our residents and staff much safer when it comes to sanitizing surfaces to reduce the risk of contaminants. Just as the Southview building's bathroom floors were finished, so to were the floors in the Valleyview apartment bathrooms. The same anti-bacterial, anti-microbial floor that was installed in the Southview bathrooms was installed in these Valleyview bathrooms to replace the old linoleum, some of which was still the original from 1985!

Maintenance is busy finishing up much of the outdoor work for the fall including installing all the Southview air conditioner covers and getting the hose reels put away. Of course, as those hose reels go into the garage for the winter, we bring out the salt pails and shovels to be prepared for the winter season to arrive. Although the sun is beautiful and can be nice and warm some days, always remember to take a jacket with you if you are venturing outside. While the seasons change so does the sun. We are adjusting the light timers outside almost weekly and will have to continue doing so until some time in November. If you happen to notice an outdoor light that isn't working like it should be, please fill out a maintenance requisition and we will get it changed or repaired as soon as possible.

Next Meeting will be held on Monday, November 13th, 2023 @ 2pm in the Craft Room



SAFETY TALK

Remember: during a fire, everyone's safety depends on good preparation and an efficient evacuation.

Fire Safety

2 Talk



- Follow your buildings security measures and keep unauthorized people out of your workplace
- Keep flammable liquid storage to a minimum and in approved containers
- Keep your workplace clutter free
- Keep alleys and other areas around your building well lit
- Keep exits, stairways, storage areas, staff rooms and work areas free from debris such as empty boxes, waste paper and dirty rags
- Keep large quantities of flammable liquids in an approved storage cabinet

Do not overload electrical

Replace electrical cords that

broken connectors and never

have cracked insulation or

run extension cords across

doorways, under carpets or

where they can be stepped on

Portable Fire Extinguishers:

- Ensure everyone has left the building before attempting to fight a fire
- Portable fire extinguishers are not designed to fight large fires or those that may spread quickly
- Everyone should read the extinguisher instructions and be trained in the safe operation of fire extinguishers
- Use portable fire extinguishers to extinguish and control small, contained fires until the fire department arrives



- Allow air to circulate around heat producing equipment such as photocopiers, computer terminals and heaters
 - Unplug or turn off all appliances including coffee makers, hot plates, and burners at the end of each day

Smokers:

- Smoke only where permitted and use large, non-tip ashtrays. Thoroughly soak butts with water before discarding
- Ensure visitors are aware of smoking regulations

Employees are responsible for...

- Knowing the location of all building exits
- Knowing the location of the nearest fire alarms and how to use them
- Counting the doors or desks between their work area and nearest exit. During a fire, exit signs may not be visible due to smoke or a power failure

Employers are responsible for...

- Posting an escape plan in a prominent location on every level
- Ensuring all employees are familiar with exit locations, escape routes and fire extinguisher locations
- Conducting regular fire drills
 - Posting the emergency numbers on or near all a telephones
- Making provisions for the safe evacuation of employees with disabilities by appointing someone to assist them
- Appointing and training a fire warden on each level of the building to ensure safe evacuation and ongoing safety programs



Electrical Safety:

- Sound the alarm and leave the building immediately, closing all doors behind you
- If smoke blocks your primary exit, use another one. If you must exit through the smoke, stay low by crawling on your hands and knees
- Check doors before opening them. Kneel or crouch at the door, reach up and touch the door, knob and frame. If you feel any warmth on or around the door, use another escape route. If the door feels cool, open it slowly and carefully with your shoulder against it. Slam the door shut if you see flames or smoke on the other side
- Call 9-1-1 no matter how small the fire appears to be
- Follow directions, from fire and security personnel. Once outside, move away from the building to the designated meeting location, out of the way of fire fighters. Remain outside until the fire department says you may go back in





WHIP UP A TREAT ENJOY AT HOME!

One of the most enjoyed and certainly most delicious programs on the recreation schedule is our baking program. The Best Banana Cake was an interesting and simple recipe and a favourite around here. Below is the recipe so you can try them at home!

Ingredients

3 Large eggs

1 tsp vanilla

3 cups flour

1/4 tsp salt

11/2 tsp baking soda

- 11/2 cups milk
- 21/2 Tbs lemon juice •
- 11/3 cups mashed banana
- 2/3 cup soft butter
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 9 x 13 pan
- 2. Place 1 1/2 tsp lemon, top to 1 1/2 cup milk
- 3. Mix mashed banana and 1 tsp lemon juice
- 4. Beat butter, brown and white sugar until combined. Add in eggs one at a time and vanilla. Mix on high till light and fluffy
- 5. Combine flour, baking soda and salt in bowl. Alternate adding flour mixture and milk to egg mixture stirring until combined. Fold in bananas.
- Place in oven and reduce heat to 300 F. Bake 60 to 70 minutes. Remove and place in freezer for 45 minutes to make the cake extra moist.
