#### HAPPY NEW YEAR!



How delighted I was when I received this precious gift!

To preserve them, they were eventually pasted on bristle board.

Little did I foresee that for more than 40 years, wherever we resided, they would be hung in a place of honour in our home every Christmas. Each year I still fold them carefully and place them in a box to preserve for the next festive season. Year after year when I open the box my heart sings with the wonder of those liberating messages:

In the Old Testament the prophet Isaiah had prophesied: "Look! The virgin will conceive a child! She will give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel, which means God with us."



In the New Testament, centuries later, these messages were given by an angel to Joseph in a dream. It was during a most stressful and confusing time when he learned his beloved Mary was going to become the mother of the Christ-Child. #### The 8 As of Dementia

The 8 A's are an easy way for caregivers to remember which areas of the brain can be affected by dementia. Each of these A's represents damage to a particular part of the brain.

As a caregiver, keep in mind that a person with dementia may not experience all of the A's. Dementia can affect several different areas of the brain, but not always at the same time.

For the next few months we'll go through each A in more detail.

**Anosognosia** – the individual no longer realizes there is something wrong.

Amnesia

Aphasia

Agnosia

Apraxia

Altered Perceptions

Apathy

Attention Deficit

## Anosognosia is not the same as denial

It's important to understand that someone who has anosognosia in dementia isn't just being difficult or in denial – this is something different.

When someone is in denial, they are aware of a fact, but refuse to accept it.

With anosognosia, the damage that dementia is causing in their brain makes it impossible for that person to be aware of what's happening to them.

#### Anosognosia

Pronounced ah-no-sog-NOH-zee-uh. The word literally means "to not know a disease".

ANOSOGNOSIA is often mistaken for denial, stubbornness or embarrassment. In fact it is actually brain damage that can make it difficult for dementia patients to recognize their impairment. Awareness can change from day-to-day or even hour-to-hour, and this can make your loved one's behaviour unpredictable.

They may resist help, refuse treatment, become angry and defensive or dangerously overestimate their abilities. And even if they forget to bathe, miss appointments, or burn food on the stove, they're still likely to insist that they don't need help. They'll probably also insist that they're absolutely capable of living independently – despite clear evidence that things are going wrong.

Anosognosia can also make people forget their physical ailments. People may try to get up from their wheelchair and walk or transfer themselves, even though they have lost their legs or just had hip surgery.

If someone reminds them of their cognitive impairment, someone with anosognosia may get angry and defensive because in their mind they're 100% convinced that there is no problem. They forget that they forget!

#### Ways to help

-Go with their reality

-Use "therapeutic fibbing"-which is similar to "stretching the truth" or using "white lies" to ease their anxiety

-Do not try to reason and use logic to help them understand, as they will get all caught up with the words and reasoning.

-Only say what needs to be said for the moment

 Avoid correcting them and having confrontations; pick your battles

Present solutions positively and subtly

- Be creative with solutions

#### MAINTENANCE CORNER

We made it! Thursday December 21st was the shortest day of the year last year, with the least amount of sunlight. Since then, our days have been getting gradually longer (and closer to springtime). With the colder weather and lower levels of daylight the winter is hard for some people. This year on January 15th it was blue Monday, the day that researchers say is the day that collectively we have the lowest mood, or with winter blues. So, if you struggle in the winter like many do, we are well on our way towards spring! If you are heading outside remember that it may not be as easy or safe as normal with the winter weather upon us. Our contractors come out on a regular basis during bad weather, but sometimes if the weather persists for a long period, it is hard to keep up. Always be sure to use caution when you are heading outside during these cold months, wearing appropriate footwear, warm winter clothing, and keeping a blanket or safety kit in your car in case of an emergency.

Inside the building things continue to change and evolve as the times do, especially with the cold and flu season upon us. Parkview has been taking steps over the last couple years to make some improvements to the building that are focused on infection prevention and control, including replacing older carpet with antibacterial vinyl and increasing cleaning at "high touch" areas. This is a step that everyone can take, and sometimes gets overlooked. Giving door handles and other frequently touched surfaces an extra wipe down with the cleaner of your choice is especially important as we all do our best to stay safe and healthy. In Gardenview the wardrobes and nightstands have received a facelift with new doors and drawer faces. A small number of rooms remain but should be fully finished within the next month.

In our Brookview building we have ordered 2 new dryers for the public laundry room, as the older units have reached the end of their functional life. They will be delivered soon and be up and ready for use. In the Brookview AND Valleyview buildings we will be having brand new mailboxes installed for our regular mail delivery. The mailbox assembly in Valleyview is the original from 1985, and the unit in Brookview is the original from 1990 and it will be nice to see the new units installed in the next month or so. They have advised that the units will be shipped to us in the next 4-6 weeks. There will be a time during this installation that the area at each mailbox will need to have access restricted or closed off temporarily as the units are relatively large and will require caution to installed. Once the units are in and Canada Post has all the labels set-up (this should all be done on the same day as installation), each resident will be assigned a key for their new mailbox. The new mailbox units may not be labelled the same way as the old ones so it is possible that your box could change location, however the functionality will remain the same.

Finally, we have been gathering a few different quotes for materials, contractors, and equipment to start the process of the updates to the Parkview dining room. This is a part of the plan to start providing the meal services for Southview residents directly in the dining room itself. Many considerations are required for water, hydro, and safety, all of which are also in progress. This will be a large project that will take time to coordinate, but in the long run will help to provide a more enjoyable dining experience for our residents.

#### "Wash Up and Help Stop the Spread of Disease!"

*FACT:* Hand washing is the single most effective way to stop the spread of infections! FACT: Up to 80% of common infections are spread by the hands!

#### Why is Washing your Hands Important?

- You can catch infectious diseases or illnesses from contact with other people - casually by hand contact or by being nearby when people cough or sneeze
- Work environments are especially conducive to ease in the spread of infection due to the number of people and the close proximity in which they interact
- Hands can easily become contaminated with disease-causing germs, and pass them along just as easily
- Five of the most common scenarios for the transmission of germs, according to the CDC,
  - Hands to food
  - Infected infant to hands to other children 0
  - Food to hands to food
  - Nose, mouth or eyes to hands to others
  - Food to hands to infants
- Ensuring that employees wash their hands properly after using the washroom is very important in reducing disease transmission of stomach "flu" (which really is not a "flu" or influenza) and other gastrointestinal infections

#### Antibacterial Soap Controversy...

- There is no need to use antibacterial soaps in the home, school or workplace
- Antibacterial soap should be reserved for hospital settings or work areas specifically identified for use
- Promotes antimicrobial resistance
- Proper hand washing with regular soap and water can remove germs very effectively
- In some workplaces, universal precautions should be followed when workers are exposed to blood and certain other body fluids

#### How to Wash your Hands Properly

- Remove any rings or other jewelry
- Use warm water and wet your
- Hands thoroughly
- Use soap (1-3 mL) and lather very well
- Scrub your hands, between your fingers, wrists, and forearms with soap for 30 seconds
- Scrub under your nails
- Rinse thoroughly
- Turn off the tap/faucets with paper towel
- Dry your hands with a single use towel or hot air dryer

#### **NEVER USE A BASIN OF STANDING** WATER FOR SHARED WASHING

#### Other Tips

- Cover cuts with bandages and wear gloves for added protection (cuts are very vulnerable to infections)
- Artificial nails and chipped nail polish have been associated with an increase in the number of bacteria on the fingernails. Be sure to clean the nails properly
- Keep your hands away from your eyes, nose or mouth
- Liquid soap in disposable containers is best
- If using reusable containers, they should be washed and dried before refilling. If using a bar of soap, be sure to set it on a rack that allows water to drain or use small bars that can be changed frequently



### WHIP UP A TREAT TO ENJOY AT HOME!

One of the most enjoyed and certainly most delicious programs on the recreation schedule is our baking program. *The Best Banana Cake* was an interesting and simple recipe and a favourite around here. Below is the recipe so you can try them at home!

#### Ingredients

- 11/2 cups milk
- 21/2 Tbs lemon juice •
- 11/3 cups mashed banana
- 2/3 cup soft butter
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar
- 3 Large eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 3 cups flour
- 1 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1/4 tsp salt

#### <u>Directions</u>

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 9 x 13 pan
- 2. Place 1 1/2 tsp lemon, top to 1 1/2 cup milk
- 3. Mix mashed banana and 1 tsp lemon juice
- Beat butter, brown and white sugar until combined. Add in eggs one at a time and vanilla. Mix on high till light and fluffy
- 5. Combine flour, baking soda and salt in bowl.
  Alternate adding flour mixture and milk to egg
  mixture stirring until combined. Fold in bananas.
- 6. Place in oven and reduce heat to 300 F. Bake 60 to 70 minutes. Remove and place in freezer for 45 minutes to make the cake extra moist.
